BAILEY.—At Reading on January 29, Mr. John Baxett Bailey, pharmaceutical chemist, aged seventy.

BETTS.—At Hastings on February 21, Mr. Samuel Betts, chemist and druggist, formerly of Freetown, aged fifty-eight. Mr. Betts was formerly in business at Baiton-in-Ashfield, Croydon, and on retiring from business had a short time ago he was succeeded by his son, Mr. Harold Betts.

HASLETT.—On March 4, at Dalrymple, Belfast, Mr. John W. Haslett, one of the partners in the firm of J. & J. Haslett, chemists and druggists, North Street, Belfast. He was a lecturer of Fitz James Haslett, M.P., head of the firm.

HEWLETT.—At 24 Great Stanhope Street, Bath, on March 2, Mr. Henry Hewleigh, chemist and druggist (for many years with Huddell's, Ltd.), aged seventy-seven.

Mr. Jones was a distinguished antiquarian and author of many works on Welsh folk-lore.

McMILLAN.—On March 7, suddenly, Mr. Thomas McMullan, of the firm of Thos. McMullan & Co., wholesale druggists and warehousemen, Victoria Street, Belfast. Aged seventy. The deceased had been attending to business until Monday, when he had a paralytic stroke and died the following evening. He was born at Glenties House, Kircubbin, co. Down, and served his apprenticeship to the grocery business with Mr. Hamilton, Ann Street, Belfast, afterwards acting as traveller to the late Mr. Wm. Dobbin, J.P., wholesale druggist, &c. In 1860 he commenced business as a wholesale druggist in partnership with the late Mr. John Clarke, under the style of Clarke & McMullan. The firm was dissolved about twenty years ago, Mr. Clarke, in conjunction with his sons, forming the business now known as John Clarke & Co., and Mr. McMullan continuing in the old premises with his two sons as Thos. McMullan & Co. The business, which is one of the most extensive in Belfast, will be continued by deceased's three sons, William, Thomas, and Frank.

MILLER.—At Tyne View House, Winton, Mr. William Miller, chemist and druggist, aged seventy-five. Mr. Miller, who retired about ten years ago, formerly carried on business at Blaydon.

Recent Wills.

DAY.—Mr. John George Day, chemical dealer, of Newmarket-on-Tyne, left estate valued at £1,312; 4s. 6d. gross, the net personality being £671; 2s. 6d.

DICKIN.—Mr. John Dunn, of Messrs. Dunn, Ross, & Co., Manchester, chemical and mineral merchants, left his estate, amounting to £5,626, among his children.

MAW.—Mr. Charles Maw, of Holmwood, Northfield, Surrey, of the firm of S. Maw, Scott and Sons, of 7 1/2 Aldgate Street, E.C., who died on January 5 last, aged eighty-one years, left estate of the gross value of £42,065; 10s. 3d., with net personality £27,310; 7s. 1d. Probate of his will, dated March 12, 1901, with two codicils dated respectively November 12, 1894, and January 2, 1905, has been granted to his son, Mr. Charles Trevelyan Maw, Mr. Muriel Trevelyan Maw, and Mr. Frederick Trevelyan Maw. The testator directed that the Parish Council of Northfield should have the use of the schoolmaster's Northfield as a "Village Field." The legacies include several hundred pounds to his servants. He bequeathed to his son Charles all his business premises in Aldgate Street, and the premises at Frodoak he bequeathed to his son Charles also, and to his son and abiding 11 Chester Place, Hyde Park, and to his son George 500s. freehold at West Coker, and at Kempt Hill, West Coker, absolutely, and to his son Percival he bequeathed 500s. and his freehold at High Street, West Coker. He left 500s. each to his wife's half-sister, Annie Sharwood, and to each of his nine daughters, and to his son Arthur Trevelyan Maw. Subject to the bequest to his son Arthur Trevelyan Maw, he bequeathed to his son Charles, he left his wife's jewelry for distribution to his nine daughters. To his late wife's half-sister, Annie Sharwood, he bequeathed all his reasonable debts, Emily Sharwood, his and dead farming stock at Northfield house, carriage, and money on interest account, and the use of his furniture and residences, and an annuity of £500, during his lifetime, charged upon the estate. Subject thereto he left his share in the firm of S. Maw, Scott & Sons, according to the terms of his partnership agreement. All the rest and residue of his estate he left to his sons, Frederick, George, and Percival, and his only daughter, in equal shares at twenty-five years.
